## **PASTOR'S CORNER**

### Inner Peace

How do we hold onto our sense of internal peace when we feel that our world is being turned upside down, shaking our core beliefs and values into a state of confusion? We live in a time when virtue seems so trite by society's current standards. And yet it is through virtue we can keep our sense of peace. By definition, virtue is morally good behavior or character. "Whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is gracious, if there is any excellence and if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things" [Phil 4:8]. Certainly Mary, our Blessed Mother, is all these things and more.

Mary's Virtues: Most pure, prudent, humble, faithful, devout, obedient, poor, patient, merciful, and sorrowful, Mary is our model of virtue. How else could Mary have taken on the responsibilities as Mother of our Savior and Mother to us all? Yes, Mary experienced anxiety, pain, and grief during her earthly lifetime. However, Mary was able to see according to God and never lose sight of God's plan for the world's salvation. Mary remained steadfast in her beliefs and core values through all her joys, works, and in her sorrows for glory to God in the highest, giving her inner peace. Being our mother, Mary shares her virtues with us to keep us steady in this unsettled world. Mary helps us to see according to God and to live as people of good will to merit glory in Heaven.

People of Good Will: Like Mary, we can praise God; we can bless Him; we can adore Him; and we can glorify Him by the way we live our lives. With virtue, we become people of good will. We tend toward the good with all our "sensory and spiritual powers"; we pursue "the good and choose it in concrete actions" [CCC 1803]. However, we cannot achieve this on our own. "Christ's gift of salvation offers us the grace necessary to persevere in the pursuit of the virtues" [CCC 1811]. By the power of our Lady's intercession to her Son, the Prince of Peace, our virtues and good works will flourish in our world. We can be a source of peace by following the way of our Savior and accepting the graces we need to be virtuous in our daily living. "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. Not as the world gives do I give it to you. Do not let your hearts be troubled or afraid," said Jesus [John 14:27].

To maintain our sense of peace in our hearts, minds, and souls, we must hold onto our virtues as given to us by God. With Mary's guidance, we can hold on by always asking for God's grace to light our way and to give us strength. Also let us not forget to frequent the sacraments and heed the promptings of the Holy Spirit to love what is good and to avoid what is evil. So long as we keep doing what we have learned from Christ in the Scriptures with the graces we have received, then the peace of our Lord will be with us always.

#### REFLECTION FOR

#### THE SECOND SUNDAY OF ADVENT

People knew over a year in advance that the Pope was coming for a visit to America and the preparations began. Security, space limitations and requirements, protocols, crowd management, itineraries, invitations, regulations, and so much more was necessary to pull this event off effectively. It's not every day that we get a visit from such a prominent dignitary. Thought, effort, meticulous attention to detail and vision all are necessary to make this thing work. After all, he can't just show up in the ordinary and normal daily routines of life and catch people unprepared! Tickets have to be purchased, buses rented, hotel rooms reserved, and travel arrangements made early because it will be impossible to see him if we wait too long!

We do this kind of preparing not only for prominent religious figures but for political dignitaries, notable sports figures, people of fame, and even actors. If an individual intrigues us, we are going to want to do all we have to do to get a "good seat" in the house. Does Jesus Christ captivate this much of our attention? We are asked to prepare the way of the Lord and to do so not with frantic frenzy but patient enthusiasm. We do not have to stand on a street corner making profound announcements about God's coming or become overly zealous in our embrace of the Good News. Our task is quieter, more interior, captivating, and consuming. We are asked to change. We have to conduct our lives with holy devotion.

Is the cost of that ticket too much for you? Don't you want the "best seat" in the house? You don't want to miss Our Lord's arrival when he comes, do you? After all, if he comes while you are going about your daily routines without you even knowing, he may catch you off guard. Or, he may come in disguise looking like a beggar, a prisoner, migrant, refugee, or someone who is lost. Would you be ready to recognize him then? Preparing for the coming of Christ requires a change of mind, heart, and behavior. It is not adequate to simply do the things we always do. We want our lives to speak of the exciting news of Christ's coming and the joy that the Gospel brings. It has to do with our demeanor, values, priorities, choices, and how we structure daily routines. Of course, it involves sacrifice. All anticipations do! Are you excited, captivated, enthusiastic, and sitting on the edge of your seat eager to celebrate his coming among us at Christmas, and waiting for him to come again? If not, why not?
